LOBBIES AND POLITICAL ACTION COMMITTEES

Most people have ideas about what the government should be doing for its citizens. As individual, we can influence Congress and the President by voting for candidates who think the way we do, by working in election campaigns, and by writing letters and e-mail to our elected officials. However, we can have an even greater effect on our government's decisions if we join together in large groups that work for the same cause. That is what lobbies and political action committees are all about.

A lobby is a special interest group. Such a group might be interested in changing the way health insurance companies treat their customers, in preventing Congress from putting greater restrictions on gun ownership, or how the government protects the environment. A lobby hires a person - a lobbyist - to communicate its point of view to Congress and to try to convince Congress to vote a certain way.

Political action committees (PACs) are a more recent development in politics. These organizations are the political branch of a special interest group. For instance, churches are not allowed to try to influence political decisions, but individuals with similar religious beliefs can form a PAC and work to change laws. PACs raise voluntary donations of money from people who agree with their cause. They give this money to election campaigns of people they support and to the political party that will work for their goals. PACs control large amounts of money. The influence this has on all our laws and our lives make it important to understand lobbies and PACs.
