Charters of the Virginia Company of London

 Guaranteed the rights of Englishmen to the colonists

Definitions:

guarantee – something that promises a particular outcome

rights – something that a person or community has a claim to by law, tradition, or nature

Virginia Declaration of Rights

* Served as a model for the Bill of Rights to the Constitution of the United States of America

Definitions:

model – a person or thing that serves as a good example of something

Declaration of Independence

- Stated grievances against king of Great Britain
- Declared colonists' independence from Great Britain
- Affirmed "certain unalienable rights" (life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness)
- * Established the idea that all people are equal under the law

Definitions:

grievance – a real or imagined wrong regarded as a just cause for complaint

independence - not controlled or guided by others

affirmed – to declare positively or firmly

unalienable – incapable of being surrendered

establish – to settle securely in a position or condition

Articles of Confederation

- * Established the first form of national government for the independent states
- Maintained that major powers resided with the individual states
- Weakness of the central government (e.g. no power to tax or enforce laws);
 led to the writing of the Constitution of the United States of America

Articles of Confederation
Definitions:
national – belonging to a group of people organized under a single government
maintain – to keep up; carry on; continue
tax – a contribution for the support of the government required of persons, groups, or businesses
enforce – to make someone observe or obey

Constitution of the United States of America and Bill of Rights

- * Established the structure of the United States government
- Guaranteed equality under the law with majority rule and the rights of the minority protected
- Affirmed individual worth and dignity of all people
- Protected the fundamental freedoms of religion, speech, press, assembly, petition

Definitions:

structure – something made up of a number of parts that are put together in a particular way

majority – the greater number or part of something; a number more than half the total

minority – the smaller number or part of something; a number less than half the total

worth - the value or usefulness of something

dignity - being worthy of respect
